Terms like 'splendid isolation' (in the field of foreign-policy) or 'laissez-faire' (in the field of economy) and the philosophical theories of Utilitarianism and Intuitivism were fundamental concepts to influence life in the 'Empire' in the second half of the 19th Century. During that time, the Industrial Revolution took place and the parliament was reformed three times (1830s -1880s). The Victorian period can be seen as the most glorious time of colonial England (if one thinks of colonialism and imperialism as glorious) but ironically also marks the decay of the 'Empire', which many Englishmen had been so proud of. In the literary world, English Romanticism dominated the early Victorian decades. Later on, Realism and Naturalism became more and more influential and in the 1890s, the New Realism and Aestheticism (including Decadence and Symbolism) took over. One...
